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and utterly safe even when Dyan, Lois, Gail and I got lost in the streets of Tel Aviv and Jerusalem (we got lost alot, but always managed to find our way with the help of very kind people).

We began our stay with an invitation to the congregation of Myriam Caro, who some of you remember as Letty. She had a nice gentleman come and pick us up at the hotel and take us to Rishon L'Tzion where they had a small Conservative congregation. All the women lit the candles together. They gave us a transliteration of the Friday night Kabbalat Shabbat service, but my Hebrew was good enough to follow without it. After a beautiful service (I am still amazed that no matter where I go, the *Aleinu* is always the same tune), they moved the chairs, brought in the tables and put out a feast with chicken soup and matzo balls, salads, turkey and all kinds of other goodies. It was delicious and we much enjoyed the company of the congregants. Myriam sends her love to all. She is doing well. We chipped in and gave them a nice donation. They gave us those ubiquitous Hamsa bracelets and tiny little copies of something Myriam called "psalms" but I think is something Cabalistic and superstitious. Israelis seem to have many superstitions.

Our tour took us to some wonderful places. We climbed about the ruins of ancient civilizations. Treading upon stones that ancient people walked upon mind-boggling centuries ago was just plain incredible.

We got to see many aspects of modern Israel, too, including the museum of the "Af Al Pi Chen," one of the "Exodus" boats. The museum is in the hull of the actual boat. We were inspired by the courage and tenacity of the people who had suffered so greatly during the Holocaust only to find more tribulation on their journey "home" to Eretz Yisrael.

We visited the Golan Heights; saw the Jordan River, which is quite small as most of the water is diverted for drinking and agriculture; spent two nights in a lovely hotel run by a Kibbutz in the Galeel; and then we went to Jerusalem.

What can I say about Jerusalem? In all of us there is a tiny piece of our hearts that, once we enter the plaza of the Western Wall, grows larger, swells our hearts and whispers to us to remember where we are and why we have come.

We visited the Kotel several times, with the tour guide and on our own on Shabbat. We even got to go through the tunnel that takes you to the closest spot to the former Holy of Holies. It was during one of those visits that I had a transforming experience. I guess you could call it an epiphany.

I was standing in the plaza on a Thursday, when the Torah is read (the Torah is read Shabbat, holidays, and every Monday and Thursday). A man with a tallit took a Torah from the ark and was walking with it to a bimah somewhere in the men's section. Out of habit, I began to quietly chant: "ki mi'tzion tay tsai Torah" ("from out of Zion shall come the Torah") "u' devar Ha'shem mi yerushalayim" (and the word of G-d from Jerusalem). All of a sudden I gasped. I was standing right there in Zion and the word of G-d was in the arms of that man right there in Jerusalem. I felt as though someone had punched me in the chest. I could not breathe. The experience was overpowering. I am filled with emotion as I type this, and I can't relate the story without crying. It was among the most powerful and meaningful moments of my life. The entire trip was wonderful, but that moment was the reason I came to Israel.

We also went to Haifa, Safed, the Dead Sea, Massada and other interesting places, so come to services on Friday night, and Dyan Banks and I will share more about out trip to Israel.
