Sharing food for thought by Richard Fourzan

One of the resolutions I made on my last birthday was to educate myself more on matters of Judaism and how I could live my life more as a Jew in a work environment where I am the only Jew in the school building. First, I decided to delve into Sephardi and Ashkenazi cuisine, making Mujadarra and Shakshuka my go-to dishes for when I want to feel both Jewish and Mexican. My mother used to cook these two recipes for us when we were kids, but under different names: arroz con lentejas (rice and lentils), and huevos ahogados (drowned eggs), both very popular menu items in hole-in-the-wall eatin' joints across Mexican territory. You can, for example, Google "Shakshuka recipe" and then "Huevos ahogados receta," and you will see how remarkably similar the images of both are.

Mentioning these similarities to my co-workers during a lunch break a while back brought about a lively discussion about why they would almost be the same (Can you guess? Think 1492 Expulsion). Now, every time I take Challah (thank you, Alma), to the teachers' lounge and share with my peers, or bake my own version of off-season Hamantaschen, or flop with the totally botched-up burekas I tried to bake once (and never again), I feel more welcome into the inner circle of those who, unknowingly, want to share tamales, or an extra ham sandwich they made for me, or a chicharron taco they bought at Stripes thinking it was time they paid back my Jewish morsel offerings to them. "Thanks, but I am eating vegan this week, maybe next time."

Aside from upping my culinary game, I also wanted to increase my knowledge in a more Jewish/ observant/sedulous way. Through the year, I researched good Jewish books to read and found myself buying more books a month than I could read in that amount of time. My Jewish bookshelf is quickly turning into a bookcase full of Jewish-related books and cookbooks, Amazon penny books, anyone?

Following are two books that I read recently, one on the High Holidays (a lot of good this one will do you when you read my late review so close to Rosh Hashanah) and a book on Hanukkah, which will give you time to look for online, in case it catches your fancy.

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Survival Kit by Shimon Apisdorf. 1992. I like to read books that keep me entertained and offer light reading, while complementing, at a higher level, what I think I already know. The High Holidays are both a happy and solemn time; well, at least to me. Apisdorf takes you by the hand in the sometimes-complicated art of High Holiday services with fun, but insightful accounts of the Holidays. His interesting paragraphs explain things in a style that make me feel like I am a five-year-old, which is exactly what I was looking for, dumb it down for me so I can internalize it, please. Apisdorf even recommends taking this little book with you to services and read it while the service is in motion so you can better understand what is going on. Having trouble with Avinu Malkeinu? Turn to Page 39 for a short explanation of what's happening. Why are the sounds of the Shofar so attractive to Jews and why won't a regular trumpet do? The answers to these questions and many more are in this little primer on the High Holidays.

Chanukah: Eight Nights of Light Eight Gifts for The Soul by Shimon Apisdorf. 1997. Like the previous book, once you start reading you won't put the book down. Apisdorf once more appeals to my inner child when he explains the story of Hanukkah in a vivid, noteworthy, and unusual way. I was finally able to understand Ptolemy, the oppression, and the Revolt in a way I don't think I will forget a month from now. From observances to customs, this book shows you exactly what Hanukkah is, how to celebrate it, and how to put yourself in a meditative mood throughout the season. Can't wait to put it to practice!

To sum up, these two gems offer a Judaism that is practical and doable without being irreverent or disrespectful. They teach how tradition can be made personal and relevant without it being distant and old. Give them a try, I paid only a penny for each at Amazon and they are worth their weight in gold. Shana Tova!.
