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# FROM THE RABBI

Shalom,

We prepare now to celebrate the great American festival of Thanksgiving, the time when we read the Torah portion of *Vayaitzay*, which contains the first mention of thanksgiving. Leah, the wife of Jacob, was the first to thank G-D for the blessing of children. She called her fourth son, Yehudah (Thank G-D), because she was grateful to the Almighty G-D for His wonderful gift.

As descendants of Yehudah we are called Yehudim or Jews, and thanking G-D is one of the most frequent expressions of our people. Every prayer either begins or concludes with a blessing. You ask a traditional Jew: "How are you?" "How are things?" Invariably, the answer is "Thank G-D." It is more than a habitual phrase. It reflects an abiding faith in a benevolent G-D and expresses the unwavering optimism and gratitude of the Jew. A dismal past or a discouraging present always gives way to a hopeful future.

# **Understanding G-d's tests**

Our life is a sum of events, and as we walk towards something, we walk away from something else. Our surroundings change even when we don't move and even more while things are in motion. We likely will end in a very different point that the one we were heading for. Success and happiness are in the hearts of the beholders, and any physical print that we leave behind us is eventually erased by the sands of time. But our acts can last for millennia. We know this to be true when we look at a man named Abram, who we read about in the Torah. Abram wondered about his own creation and found G-d. was obedient and faithful, lived a life of hard work and, knowing he was responsible for people other than himself, acted accordingly. His life was also full of events, circumstances and situations that we understand were tests, as we read on Bereishis 22:1. But I ask myself how can G-d test Abraham or any of us when he knows the outcome at the time of inception? The only logical purpose is that the test itself is for us. We are testing ourselves for our own benefit. I think Abraham knew this and found blessing in everything because he knew G-d knew better. G-d said of him, "For I have loved him, because he commands his children and his household after him that they keep the way of Hashem, doing charity and justice." (Bereshis 18:19).

Then our print in this world is left when we teach and lead our children and household to do Tzedaka and Justice (what's right and just). If we understand this, we must live what we teach. It will be easy to recognize our creator, and we will be G-d-fearing people like Abraham Avinu. We will know that fear of G-d is a fear of not loving Him with all our hearts, the fear of not letting G-d in our lives, of not trust-

ing Him. Like G-d said to Abram, "Fear not, I am a shield for you; your reward is very great" (Bereishis 15:1) ... and it is written that "he trusted in Hashem, and reckoned it to him as righteousness (Bereishis 15:6). He had faith in G-d and knew He knew better, that G-d would do what was right.)

Most of us have not lived through situations and tests as difficult as those faced by Abraham, though the difficulty of a test is in the heart of the beholder. Abraham never faltered. At every turn he tried to help others and do what was necessary, including trying to convince G-d not to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah, or going to war to release his nephew Lot who had been kidnapped. G-d did His part, and here we are today teaching and leading our children — the descendants of Abraham — and our household in Tzedaka and Justice and learning about his life.

May we find good and blessings in our ways, may our tests become opportunities, and may we be G-d-fearing people soon, fearing not to trust Him. And when our time comes, may we be like Abraham — as the Torah says, he "expired and died at a good old age, mature and content." Then our teachings and actions will last for millennia.

# Recipe

# **Southwestern Turkey Soup**

Ingredients:

1 1/2 cups cooked turkey

4 cups vegetable broth

28 ounce can whole tomatoes

4 ounce can chopped chiles

2 roma tomatoes, chopped

1 onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, crushed

1 tablespoon lime juice

1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin salt and pepper to taste

1 avocado, diced

1/2 teaspoon dried cilantro

#### Directions:

- 1. In a large pot over medium heat, combine top 11 ingredients. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat, and simmer 15 to 20 minutes
- 2. Stir in avocado and cilantro, and simmer 15 to 20 minutes, until slightly thickened. Spoon into serving bowls.

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# Oneg Shabbat

Oneg Shabbat means "Joy of Sabbath." It is meant to be a gathering to express outwardly the happiness inherent in celebrating the Sabbath. This is in keeping with the biblical injunction "and call the Sabbath a delight" (Isaiah 58:13). Usually refreshments are provided to complement the congenial atmosphere and perpetuate in spirit the Talmud's recommendation to eat three full meals a day. Traditionally at Temple Beth Israel, this Mitzvah is satisfied by set up, clean up, tablecloth care, wine/ juice, challah and some light refreshments. Unless we are having a pot luck Shabbat dinner, a meal is not expected. It is not meant to be a burden, but rather a Mitzvah to help celebrate the Sabbath. For those who wish to "delight" your fellow congregants with your culinary skills and enjoy hosting, please feel free to express your joy.

# Jewish Museum of Tolerance inaugurated in Russia

MOSCOW - Israeli President Shimon Peres, who is on an official visit to Russia, inaugurated the Jewish Museum of Tolerance on Thursday in the presence of Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov.

The cost of the museum is estimated at \$60 million, and its sponsors include the World Zionist Congress and American businessman Ronald Lauder.

The idea to establish a museum of tolerance in Russia was supported by President Vladimir Putin, who even suggested donating his monthly salary for the project. The museum includes an interactive center with a variety of changing exhibitions, a scientific center, a children's center, and a modern arts center.


